Outcome Measurement Process

What is an Outcome?

An outcome is a <u>specific benefit</u> that results from a library program or service designed to help patrons change their knowledge, skills, attitudes, behavior, or condition.

What is an Outcome?

Outcomes can be *quantitative* or *qualitative*.

What is an Outcome?

Outcomes are generally expressed as changes individuals perceive in themselves.

What is an Outcome?

An outcome statement answers the question:

What good did we do?

Examples of Outcomes



What is an Output?

An output is a measure of the <u>volume</u> or <u>performance</u> of a library's actions. Outputs are usually <u>quantitative</u>. What is an Output?

Outputs are NOT outcomes.

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Survey Development

- o Three information and data gathering activities:
 - PLDS 2014 asked about current practice capturing outcomes, feedback on topical categories, importance of measuring outcomes, and ability/willingness to report outcomes measures
 - Used feedback to narrow categories, develop and test surveys (spring-fall 2014)
 - PLDS 2015 asked about strategic plans and emphasis on outcomes measurement



Survey Example: Early Literacy

Multiple choice questions measure:

- Learned something new
- Increased confidence
- Anticipated change in behavior
- Increased awareness



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Survey Example: Early Literacy


Open-ended questions measure:

- General patron feedback
- Suggestions for improvement
- Program details
