

Electronic Materials:

What Goes Where in the Colorado Public Library Annual Report (PLAR)

Please note: A good rule of thumb for reporting e-material **use** is that if the item has a circulation period, it should be counted in “Use of Electronic Materials” (5.22). If the item does NOT have a circulation period, it should be counted in “Successful Retrieval of Electronic Information” (5.24).

For any e-materials that have “pay-per-use” models (for example, Hoopla), you should **only** report the number of titles that were actually used and therefore paid for.
