# 2022 Library Jobline Fast Facts

Library Jobline connects qualified job seekers with open positions in libraries and museums nationwide through tailored search options and a robust network of employer subscribers. In 2022, the site posted 188 more jobs than it did in 2021. New user data from Library Jobline shows that under half of new users (42%) were employers while over half (58%) were job seekers. Overall, there was an 18% decrease in new users but a 17% increase in job postings compared to 2021.

### The Number of Job Postings By State in 2022

The top three states with the most job postings are Colorado with 48% of posts, Rhode Island with 13% of posts, and Wyoming with 6% of posts.

#### Job Posts Peaked Early In 2022

In 2022 there was a 17% increase in job postings from 2021 and a 135% increase in job postings compared to 2020.

The new record for the number of jobs posted in a month is 131, which was set in March 2022. The previous record was 124 in 2021.

There are 4,231 total Library Jobline users.

In 2022 there were 178 new job seekers and 127 new employers.

#### Degree Requirements

30% of job posts indicated that an MLIS degree was required for the position. Slightly more (36%) did not require an MLIS degree. About 18% of job posts did not specify if a degree was required, preferred, or not required.

- Required MLIS Degree 30%
- Preferred MLIS degree 16%
- Did not require MLIS degree 36%
- No data 18%

2021 Graduates of LIS programs found similar employment rates but higher job satisfaction.

According to Library Journal's Placements and Salaries Survey 2022, 86% of 2021 LIS graduates are employed full-time. Seven out of ten (71%) are employed in an LIS field. 76% of those with a job expressed satisfaction with their placement, which is up 11 percentage points from last year.

### Posts by Library Type

- Public 73%
- Academic 19%
- School (K-12) 2%

75% of posts were for full-time positions.

## Average starting wages for the past 3 years

Wages for jobs not requiring a MLIS and wages for jobs preferring an MLIS both increased from 2021. The wage increase in 2022 for jobs not requiring a MLIS degree and jobs preferring a MLIS degree was 9% and 10% respectively. Wages for jobs that require a MLIS degree fell by 5% after jumping 15% in 2021.

Average hourly wages are calculated based on the salary ranges employers report in job posts. Annual salaries are calculated based on an assumption of working 40 hours per week and 52 weeks per year.
